2. Tiramisu, Rome, Italy. And it's gotta be from Pompi. You'll find these takeaway tubs of creamy goodness at a few outlets around the city (Via

Albalonga 7/B-9-11; via della Croce 82; and via Cassia 8B- 8C) and they're easily the best in Rome – some say the best in the world.

4. Asian high tea, Bali, Indonesia. Biku (888 Jalan Raya Petitenget, Petitenget) is a must-visit. And if you've sipped too many cocktails, a Hangover Happy Meal breakfast at Sea Circus (22 Jalan Kayu Aya [Oberoi Rd], Seminyak) – complete with a massage – will set you straight.

5. Hawker food, Lau Pa Sat market, Singapore. Don't worry if you can't decide what to eat – this market is open 24 hours, so you can work your way through every fragrant dish (18 Raffles Quay, Singapore).

3. Hot dogs, New York City, USA.

Get one with the lot – sauerkraut, ketchup, mustard, cheese, the works! Locals love Gray's Papaya (2090 Broadway) and the mac-and-cheese-topped version at Ditch Plains (100 West 82nd St and 29 Bedford St).
